Mansfield Research Innovation Award

In recognition of Sir Peter Mansfield's contribution to Magnetic Resonance, **Siemens have donated up to £5,000 per annum for 5 years to support early career level, (circa 5 years postdoctoral level)**, wishing to travel to the ISMRM annual exhibition to present an accepted oral presentation of their work

in an innovative field of MRI.

The applicants will be full members of the BCISMRM and their submitted work must have been judged to be of the highest standard and accepted for oral presentation by the ISMRM judging panel, and not in receipt of another prize.

If you are an early career postdoctoral researcher, with an oral presentation at the ISMRM, **please submit your abstract(s) including programme number, and CV to Penny Gowland (penny.gowland@nottingham.ac.uk) by 3rd May** if you wish to be considered for this award.

The decision will be taken by BCISMRM committee with Siemens Healthineers, to select either one or two recipients for the Sir Peter Mansfield Travel award, to cover the costs of your travel, subsistence and accommodation at the ISMRM annual exhibition.

Rewind: Be Kind

Partly inspired by the group [**Scientists are Humans**](#), Nikou Damestani (Student Observer 2018/19) organised and moderated the workshop “**How to be a Kind Scientist**” at the postgrad meeting in Birmingham.

A panel including Penny Gowland (University of Nottingham), Mark Lythgoe (University College London), Yolanda Ohene (PhD Student, University College London), and David Wilkinson (Institute of Physics) discussed topics including **career prospects, feedback and public engagement**.

The conclusions were:

- **Be aware of your conscious and unconscious bias** – are reviewers’ or authors’ names revealed? Does this affect your decision on where to submit and what kind of feedback you are sending?
- **Be willing to show off your research** – changes won’t happen in how science is perceived unless we translate it positively.
- **Don’t hide behind a keyboard** - remember your reviews are read by humans: are you being constructive or cruel?
- **Be aware of top-down fear** – be aware of the messages you are sending to MSc and PhD students about careers, there is a huge amount of negativity despite the high level qualifications achieved and available career prospects!

At the Birmingham meeting we also elected a new Student Observer of 2019/20, **Charith Perera** from UCL. He did an excellent pitch about his work in mental health support for students (and many thanks to his competitor **Andrea Torchi** for also giving a great pitch). Future-proof your Society!

As scientists, we are best-placed to understand the now **unequivocal evidence for man-made climate change**, and to fully appreciate its potential consequences. Arguably, this perspective gives us a **unique responsibility** to carefully consider our own environmental impact, both as individuals and as a profession. For example, it is now well understood that **air travel is a significant contributor to carbon emissions**, and numerous bodies now advise minimising the number of flights that we take.

Yet **scientists are heavily reliant on air travel**, with international conferences forming an integral part of science, requiring us to accumulate far above-average air miles. With this in mind, I wondered what measures ISMRM, and other large scientific societies, have in place to minimise the environmental impact of their meetings and workshops.



There's currently no mention of it on the ISMRM website. Could ISMRM develop its mission statement to encourage sustainability and reduce environmental impact, and visibly incorporate these practices into its activities? Could it establish a committee for environmental sustainability? Could it offer incentives for green travel, and establish virtual or distributed meetings (which would also enable those to attend who cannot travel)?

I hope that some of these ideas, and more could be discussed in Montreal. As a start, I've set up a **#sustainability channel on the ISMRM2019 Slack workspace**. I would really value your thoughts!
